Welcome to our online open house!


Short layovers between trips help keep our buses running on time. We're planning to build several off-street facilities for bus layovers near downtown Seattle in the near future. These "bus hubs" will free up curb space on Seattle streets where many of our buses lay over today. They'll also accommodate more buses as we increase service to meet growing demand.




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What's a bus hub?

Today, Metro and the City of Seattle work together to find layover spaces for buses along city streets. But the growing demand for bus service means more buses will need to lay over between trips. Meanwhile, the city is growing, too, and has other uses for its on-street spaces.

So Metro is creating new off-street layover facilities, called bus hubs, for buses to use while getting ready for their next trips.



Why do we need bus

After finishing their trips, Metro buses often wait for a few minutes before starting their next trips. These planned layovers are important. They help late buses start their next trips on time. They also allow bus drivers to take their breaks, helping them stay alert behind the wheel.

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What will Metro bus hubs be like?

Some will be designed as surface facilities for buses only. Others may combine bus layovers with other uses like shopping, restaurants, offices, or housing.

Benefits of bus hubs

- Help keep buses on time
- Free street space for other uses
- Move "out of service" buses into off-street hubs instead of scattering them around city streets
- Provide safe and reliable restrooms and break areas for bus drivers
- Support future extensions of bus service to new neighborhoods

Other uses for curbside space

When bus layovers are moved off the street, other uses for the space could include parking, bike lanes, bike racks, outdoor restaurant seating, etc.

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
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Seattle Land Use Code

Metro and the City of Seattle are working together to create potential legislation that would:

- ▶ Define bus layover facilities in the Land Use Code
- Create a process for permitting them
- ▶ Include standards to help bus hubs fit into three neighborhoods (South Lake Union, Uptown, and the area north of downtown Seattle)



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Eastlake Site

We're designing our first bus hub on Eastlake Avenue E. It'll be a surface-level facility on the east side of the street, next to I-5, between Roy and E Harrison streets.

When built, it'll accommodate approximately 12 buses, as well as small offices that will provide bus operators with secure restrooms, break space, and operations space. The site will not be open to the public or transit riders, but we are incorporating public feedback into its design.

The Eastlake site is targeted to be operational in 2020.

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


